Measuring the impact of PPG

We have evaluated the impact of pupil premium (PP) spending on each pupil. Evaluation focused on academic gains and how pupils' self-confidence has developed as a consequence of the interventions. % of pupil premium compared with non-pupil premium children who reached age related expectations at the end of year two 2015

The gap between Pupil Premium children compared with Non-Pupil Premium children attaining age related expectations at the end of year 2 narrowed when compared with 2014 (reading and maths). Pupil Premium children continue to attain well against Non-Pupil Premium children in writing.
