E-safety: This is a copy of my message from last year about E-safety. It's still as relevant today: As we approach the Christmas holidays and children will doubtless have some free time to pursue online activities, can I ask parents to be extra vigilant about E-Safety issues please? The question that all parents need to be asking is: Is my child safe online? Unfortunately, all the data seems to suggest that the answer to this question is: No. The simple truth is that our children are too young and innocent to fully understand the dangers of communicating with strangers online, or to deal with the emotional fall-out and 'bullying' caused by falling out with 'frenemies' (friends/enemies) online. In addition, what happens on online at home can often have a knock-on effect in the classroom that detracts from the important task of learning. I deal with at least one incident a month that is directly linked to children communicating inappropriately with each other online, be it through Skype, Facebook, MSN or the like. Sometimes children are too young to have accounts, but have done so with parental blessing. There is so much good about the internet – what did we do before Google could search a word in an instant or Wikipedia could give us the answers? But children shouldn't be left alone online. It is not safe. Please make sure you always know who your children are communicating with on line.
