SUMMARY OF PUPIL PREMIUM PUPILS AND THEIR PROGRESS

Measuring the impact of the Pupil Premium Grant

We have evaluated the impact of pupil premium (PP) spending on each pupil. Evaluation focused on academic gains and how pupils' self-confidence has developed as a consequence of the interventions.

Pupil Premium analysis 2019

Year 1 Phonics screening check- 88% of all pupils met the threshold for the PSC compared to 82% nationally. 90% of PPG at Ecclesbourne pupils met the threshold (from a cohort of 20). Compared with 71% nationally.

In Year 2, PPG children (discounting 5 SEN children) performed less well than non PPG children except in Reading where performance was the same. The largest gap was in maths (10%). Nationally the gap in maths was -16%.

Impact of Pupil Premium on pupil attainment and progress 2019-20

Pupil premium children performed as well as, or better than, non-pupil premium children in all areas at Key Stage Two except in Reading where there was a -8% gap. However, PPG children outperformed PPG children nationally. Pupil Premium children made marginally better progress than all children in reading and maths and progress was similar in writing. Progress was in line with children nationally.
