SUMMARY OF PUPIL PREMIUM PUPILS

Measuring the impact of PPG

We have evaluated the impact of pupil premium (PP) spending on each pupil. Evaluation focused on academic gains and how pupils' self-confidence has developed as a result of the interventions.

Pupil Premium analysis 2017

Year 1 Phonics screening check- 90% of all pupils met the threshold for the PSC compared to 81% nationally. 78% of PPG pupils met the threshold. 95% of non-PPG met the threshold. The percentage gap between those who met the threshold for the PSC is 17% when comparing PPG and

non-PPG pupils. 68% of PPG pupils met the standard nationally compared with 84% of non-PPG pupils. Nationally this gap was 16%.

Year 2 Phonics screening check (cumulative)- 91% for all pupils. Nationally this was 92%. 73% PPG pupils passed the PSC compared with 70% for non-PPG pupils. Still awaiting national data for comparison purposes.
