We would say that we are very good, and the commentary of our report suggests that our inspector felt the same way. Much has changed since our last inspection in 2012: We have grown by 6 classes on two sites, the old national curriculum has gone taking assessment levels with it, end of key stage tests have become more challenging and the Ofsted inspection framework has become more demanding; so we are all very pleased that we have maintained our standards through these changing times. I'm really happy that our inspector identified that we maintain high standards but don't forget that, for children, coming to school should be an enjoyable experience and learning should be fun. This is a belief held dear by all within the Pegasus Academy Trust and his comment that children were smiling and enjoying themselves was particularly pleasing. Our areas for future development ask something of you, the parents, too. Read with your children every night. Ensure that your children complete their Mathletics homework. We are all working together to make Whitehorse Manor Junior School the best that it can be and I thank all of you for demonstrating your trust and belief in the school. Onwards and upwards, 'As Good As Gold', working together, under our R.I.B.A. award winning golden roof!

World Book Day: We made sure that 'World Book Day' didn't just turn into 'World Dressing Up Day' by encouraging our children to think about their favourite Roald Dahl characters and be 'homemade' and inventive.
