At Beulah, we take very seriously our responsibility to prepare children for life in modern Britain. We ensure that the fundamental British Values are introduced, discussed and lived through our 'Pegasus People Values' which embody the ethos and work of the school. All curriculum areas provide a vehicle for furthering understanding of these concepts and, in particular, RE and PSHE lessons and our whole and class assemblies, which provide excellent opportunities to deepen and develop understanding. Children embrace these concepts with enthusiasm and demonstrate a good understanding of their application to their own lives. The school makes considerable efforts to ensure children have exposure to a wide range of experiences beyond their local community. Children have the opportunity to apply their understanding of British values through for example, special events, school trips and through visiting speakers from all faiths and groups. This gives them an excellent platform for embracing and celebrating our differences and uniqueness as individuals.

Children visit places of worship that are important to different faiths. Our collective worship, RE and PSHE lessons reinforce messages of tolerance and respect for others. The children at Beulah see democracy as being an essential component of successful team working. It is a value that children meet when exploring respect and fairness in a range of contexts beginning in Nursery. From Reception, children decide upon their school councillors through a democratic school election. The school council meet regularly to discuss issues arising and meet knowing that they have a strong voice that can action change. 	All pupils have the opportunity to be elected to the school council each year and this group contributes towards decision making in the school. From their first days at school, pupils experience and learn about fairness and turn taking in the classroom and on the playground. Class based activities and small group teaching helps children to acquire the skills to work cooperatively in a group or pairs as well as the whole class. Sport is also used to teach pupils about fairness and the importance of turn taking.

This value, along with others, is embedded in daily school life at Beulah and constantly referenced in our celebration and achievement assemblies. These might celebrate progress, good work, improved behaviour and those who strive for excellence. They are consulted on many aspects of school life through their Class Representative. Children understand the importance of showing respect for self and others in the wider community and recognise that they have rights and responsibilities. Pupils are developing their understanding of basic human rights. Pupils are able to accept responsibility for their actions. Pupils take pride in receiving awards, certificates and prizes. Pupils enjoy the days we collect for charity. They appreciate the fact that they are more fortunate than many others. Pupils show respect for each other and themselves when playing games and competing in sporting events.

They understand how rules affect the wider society for the greater good. As a result of a deep understanding of the need for the rule of law, the behaviour of Beulah students is good. They make sensible decisions and understand the possible consequences of poor behaviour choices and how they may impact others.
Individual Liberty Links to Pegasus Values: We strive to be independent learners/ We are safe, healthy and happy	Our students are encouraged to know, understand and exercise their rights and personal freedoms and are advised how to do this safely. They are also encouraged to make personal and individual choices in lessons and outside of the classroom. In lessons for instance, children select the level of challenge they feel ready for and progress from their chosen starting point. We believe that freedoms are attached to responsibilities. We explore the meaning of equality and fairness in a range of contexts throughout the curriculum. Our children are taught the value and reasons behind rules, as well as laws that govern and protect us. As a result, pupils take responsibility for their own behaviour. They speak freely and respectfully to their peers and adults on the playground and in their classrooms. They respectfully listen to the views of others and are encouraged to thoughtfully explain why they agree or disagree. Vulnerable children are protected and stereotypes challenged within this school. There is also a strong anti-bullying culture embedded at Beulah.
