SUMMARY OF PUPIL PREMIUM PUPILS AND THEIR ATTAINMENT AND PROGRESS Measuring the impact of the Pupil Premium Grant on pupil attainment and progress 2019/20

Schools closed in March 2020 due to the Coronavirus pandemic and end of Key Stage tests were cancelled. It is not possible to measure the impact of PPG quantitatively based on test results. During Lockdown the school supported PPG pupils particularly by:

• Providing a daily 'hot meal' food service for the duration of Lockdown and provisions to supplement the national voucher scheme;

• Providing home delivery service of meals, provisions and work for pupils in families where attending the school site was not possible;

· Regular telephone contact to support learning and mental and emotional well-being.
