At Ecclesbourne, we take very seriously our responsibility to prepare children for life in modern Britain. We ensure that the fundamental British Values are introduced, discussed and lived through our 'Pegasus People Values' which embody the ethos and work of the school. All curriculum areas provide a vehicle for furthering understanding of these concepts and, in particular, our RE and PSHE lessons and collective worship sessions, which provide excellent opportunities to deepen and develop understanding. Children embrace these concepts with enthusiasm and demonstrate a good understanding of their application to their own lives. The school makes considerable efforts to ensure children have exposure to a wide range of experiences beyond their local community. Children have the opportunity to apply their understanding of British values through for example, sporting events, residential visits, school trips and through visiting speakers from all faiths and groups. This gives them an excellent platform for embracing and celebrating our differences and uniqueness as individuals.

It is a values: We care/We have good manners/We strive to be independent learners Nursery. From Year 2, children decide upon their school councillors through a democratic school election. The school council meet regularly to discuss issues arising and meet knowing that they have a strong voice that can action change. The Year 6 cohort also vote on House and Vice Captains for each house using the democratic process at the beginning of each year. All pupils have the opportunity to be elected to the school council each year and this group contributes towards decision making in the school. From their first days at school, pupils experience and learn about fairness and turn taking in the classroom and on the playground. Class based activities such as Circle Time help children to acquire the skills to work cooperatively in a group or pairs as well as the whole class. This is a whole school celebration recognising success during the week. This might celebrate progress, good work, improved behaviour and those who strive for excellence.
