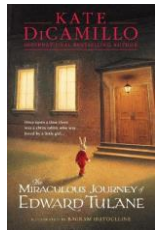

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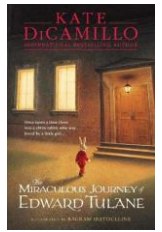

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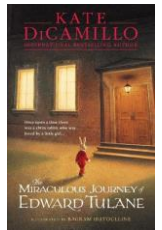

## Syllables

Words can be broken down into units called syllables. A word can have one or more syllables. You can count the syllables by saying the word and clapping out the parts. For example, "cat" has one syllable, "li on" has two syllables, and "e le phant" has three syllables.
